ABOUT THE AUDIT

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Public Utility District No. 1 of Asotin County.

We performed audit procedures to determine whether the District complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures. We also examined District management's accountability for public resources. Our work focused on specific areas that have potential for abuse and misuse of public resources.

Areas examined during the audit were selected using financial transactions from January 1, 2008, through December 31, 2008.

RESULTS

The District complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined. Internal controls were adequate to safeguard public assets.

Description of the District

ABOUT THE DISTRICT

Public Utility District No. 1 of Asotin County was formed in 1984 and took over water system operations from a private company in April 1987. The District is the exclusive distributor of residential and commercial water services to approximately 6,850 customers in Asotin County.

An elected, three-member Board of Commissioners governs the District. The Board appoints a General Manager to oversee the District's daily operations as well as its 15 employees. For fiscal year 2008, the District had an annual operating budget of approximately \$3.5 million.

AUDIT HISTORY

We audit the District annually. The District has had no findings since acquiring and beginning its operational activities in April 1987. This reflects the District's commitment to strong internal controls and compliance with state laws and regulations.
