ABOUT THE AUDIT

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Public Utility District No. 1 of Asotin County.

We performed audit procedures to determine whether the District complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures. We also examined District management's accountability for public resources. Our work focused on specific areas that have potential for abuse and misuse of public resources.

Areas examined during the audit were selected using financial transactions from January 1, 2007, through December 31, 2007.

RESULTS

The District complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined. Internal controls were adequate to safeguard public assets.

Description of the District

ABOUT THE DISTRICT

Public Utility District No. 1 of Asotin County was formed in 1984 and took over water system operations from a private company in April 1987. The District is the exclusive distributor of residential and commercial water services to approximately 6,750 customers in Asotin County.

The District is administered by a three-member Board of Commissioners, which appoints a General Manager to oversee daily operations. The District operates on an annual budget of approximately \$3.8 million and has 18 employees.

AUDIT HISTORY

We audit the District annually. The District had no findings since acquiring and beginning its operational activities in April 1987. This reflects the District's commitment to strong internal controls and compliance with state laws and regulations.

Audit Areas Examined

Public Utility District No. 1 of Asotin County May 12, 2008

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every portion of Public Utility District No. 1 of Asotin County's financial activities during each audit. The areas examined were those representing the highest risk of noncompliance, misappropriation or misuse. Other areas are audited on a rotating basis over the course of several years. The following areas of the District were examined during this audit period:

We evaluated the District's accountability and compliance with laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements in the following areas:

- Billings/receivables
- Contracts/agreements
- Open public meetings/records laws
- Procurement (bidding)
- Disbursements/expenditures
- Payroll/personnel
- Conflict of interest/ethics laws

ABOUT THE STATE AUDITOR'S OFFICE

The State Auditor's Office is established in the state's Constitution and is part of the executive branch of state government. The State Auditor is elected by the citizens of Washington and serves four-year terms.
